RESOLUTION NO. 6

A RESOLUTION OF THE MONO COUNTY CHILD CARE COUNCIL PROCLAIMING A LOCAL EMERGENCY, RATIFYING THE PROCLAMATION OF A STATE OF EMERGENCY BY GOVERNOR NEWSOM'S ORDER DATED MARCH 4, 2020, AND AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERENCE MEETINGS FOR THE PERIOD OF APRIL 14, 2022 TO MAY 13, 2022

Recitals

WHEREAS, the Mono County Child Care Council ("Council") is committed to preserving and nurturing public access and participation in its public meetings; and

WHEREAS, all meetings the Council's legislative bodies are open and public, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act (Gov. Code, §§ 54950 – 54963), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, and watch the Council's legislative bodies conduct their business; and

WHEREAS, the Brown Act, Government Code section 54953(e), makes provisions for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions; and

WHEREAS, a required condition is that a state of emergency is declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state caused by conditions as described in Government Code section 8558; and

WHEREAS, a proclamation is made when there is an actual incident, threat of disaster, or extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the jurisdictions that are within the Council's boundaries, caused by natural, technological or human-caused disasters; and

WHEREAS, it is further required that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or, the legislative body meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, such conditions now exist in the Council, specifically, the State of Emergency declared by Governor Newsom on March 4, 2020, due to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, meeting in person presents an imminent risk to health and safety of attendees, including those who may not be vaccinated, are vulnerable, and those who are elderly or have underlying medical conditions; and

WHEREAS, the Mono County Child Care Council does hereby find that the rise in SARS-CoV-2 Delta Variant has caused, and will continue to cause, conditions of peril to the safety of persons within the Council that are likely to be beyond the control of services, personnel,

equipment, and facilities of the Council, and desires to proclaim a local emergency exists and ratify the proclamation of state of emergency by the Governor of the State of California; and

WHEREAS, as a consequence of the local emergency, the Mono County Child Care Council does hereby find that the legislative bodies of the Council shall conduct their meetings without following with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Government Code section 54953, as authorized by subdivision (e) of section 54953, and that such legislative bodies shall comply with the requirements to provide the public with access to meetings as prescribed in paragraph (2) of subdivision (e) of section 54953; and

WHEREAS, the Mono County Child Care Council will ensure that the public has access to meetings and the opportunity to participate in meetings in the interest of transparency and as required by the Government Code and AB 361. Individuals wishing to provide public comment in real time will be able to do so. Public comment is allowed on both agendized and non-agendized matters. In addition to oral public comment, written public comment can also be submitted and will be considered. All written public comments will be forwarded to the Council members. All written public comment received shall become part of the official record. In the event of a service disruption that prevents broadcasting the meeting or in the event of a disruption within the Council's control that prevents public comment for members of the public using the call-in option or internet-based option, the Council will stop the meeting and take no further action on agenda items until public access is restored.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED by the Mono County Child Care Council, as follows:

- 1. <u>Recitals</u>. The Recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Resolution by this reference.
- 2. Proclamation of Local Emergency. The Council hereby proclaims that a local emergency now exists throughout the Council, and COVID-19 has caused, and will continue to cause, conditions of peril to the safety of persons within the Council that are likely to be beyond the control of services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of the Council. Meeting in person presents an imminent risk to health and safety of attendees, especially those who may not be vaccinated, are vulnerable, or have underlying health conditions. There is additionally a recommendation of social distancing.
- 3. <u>Ratification of Governor's Proclamation of a State of Emergency</u>. The Council hereby ratifies the Governor of the State of California's Proclamation of State of Emergency, effective as of its issuance date of March 4, 2020.
- 4. Remote Teleconference Meetings. The Coordinator and Staff of the Council are hereby authorized and directed to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this Resolution including, conducting open and public meetings in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e) and other applicable provisions of the Brown Act.

5. Effective Date of Resolution. This Resolution shall take effect on April 14, 2022, and shall be effective until the earlier of (i) May 13, 2022, or such time the Council adopts a subsequent resolution in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e)(3) to extend the time during which the legislative bodies of the Council may continue to teleconference without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of section 54953.

Number of subsidized slots is determined by the number of child care slots a program is licensed for.

To determine the % of eligible <u>underserved</u> children divide number eligible underserved children by the number of eligible children multiple by 100.

Additional information: To determine the % of children served divide the number of subsidized slots by the number of eligible children.

Swall Meadows, Paradise and Chalfant have a Zip Code that is in both Mono and Inyo County. Mono County makes up 7.3% of over all number. To determine the number of children for that zip code you multiplied the total number of children for that zip code by .073. They are closer to Inyo County and receive services there

- *Children in June Lake often receive services in Lee Vining.
- ** Children in Walker often receive services in Coleville.

The # of child care slots is a combination of Family Child Care Home and Licensed Child Care slots. The specific # is determined by the number of children the Family Child Care Home (FCCH) and Licensed Child Care is licensed for and assuming most FCCH slots are for infants and toddlers. This number excludes the Mountain Warfare Training Center (MWTC) Child Development Center as these slots are restricted by parental employment.

Walker was set as a priority 3 because children in this zip code receive services in Coleville.

Benton was set as a priority 3 because they have less than 10 children. Swall/Par/Chal was set as a priority 3 because the children living in this area receive services in Bishop, Inyo County or drive up to Mammoth for care. June Lake was set as a priority 2 because they meeting the priority setting requirement for a priority 1, however, children in June often receive services in Lee Vining and or Mammoth. Coleville was set as a priority 1 because locally children in Walker receive services in Coleville. Walker was set as a priority 3 because children in this zip code receive services in Coleville.

Zip Code Priorities for School-Aged Care (CCTR) age group 6-12 yrs

Benton was set as a priority 3 because they have less than 10 children. Swall/Par/Chal was set as a priority 3 because the children living in this area receive services in Bishop, Inyo County or drive up to Mammoth for care. Bridgeport is set as a priority 1 because they have 30 children and 100% of the need is unmet. June Lake was set as a priority 3 because the children in June receive services in Lee Vining and/or Mammoth. Coleville was set as a priority 1 because locally children in Walker receive services in Coleville. Walker was set as a priority 3 because children in this zip code receive services in Coleville.

Local Planning Council Priority Setting Process for State Child Care and Preschool Funds (Approved 10-13-14)

History

In 1998, AB 1857-Escutia amended the Education Code, Section 8499.5, to include specific expanded mandates for Local Child Care Planning Councils (LPCs) (8499.5 (a) through (e)). One of these was an expansion of the existing LPC mandate to identify local priorities for the distribution of new state child care and development and preschool funding. The Education Code language specifies how LPCs are to conduct their work in order to identify priorities which will ensure that all the child care and preschool needs of the county are met to the greatest extent possible. The priorities are to be submitted annually to the California Department of Education and used by the Department to determine funding decisions.

The Priority Setting Process

Local Planning Councils develop priorities for funding using:

- Census zip code data and American Community Survey data as a baseline to estimate
 the number of children eligible for State Funded Services (and Head Start). Other
 pertinent local data, such as county growth factors, planning department data, or school
 district growth data, is then applied to achieve the most accurate estimate.
- CDE and other available zip code level data to determine the number and percent of eligible children served/not served by State or Federally Funded Services
- California Academic Performance Index, Smarter Balanced Assessment, or other School Performance Data or Child Outcome Data

The data is then analyzed using the Priority 1, 2, and 3 number and percentage thresholds and methodology, described in Attachment 1, to assign county zip codes to Priority 1, 2, or 3 designation.

These priorities are first reviewed and approved by the members of the Local Planning Council for each county, which is made up of parent consumers of child care, child care and preschool providers, public agency representatives and community agency representatives, who have been appointed by the County Board of Supervisors and the County Superintendent of Schools. The priorities are next made available for public review and finally reviewed and approved by the County Board of Supervisors at public hearing as prescribed in State regulations.

I am writing regarding Town efforts related to childcare needs and facilities within the Town of Mammoth Lakes. We appreciate your interest in this matter and share your concerns regarding the need for additional dependable childcare within the Town. Many of our own employees are impacted by a variety of challenges relating to childcare.

I also want to specifically address some concerns expressed by the Commission regarding a CDBG grant application for a childcare site feasibility study that the Town ultimately did not pursue. On April 21st, the Town Council approved the submission of a Planning & Technical Assistance CDBG grant application for a 'Child-Care Needs Assessment and Project Feasibility Study' in an amount not to exceed \$250,000. Town Planning staff then worked closely with Molly DesBaillets of First 5 on the grant application. A lot of work went into the application both on the part of the Town and First 5. The concept presented to Town Council proposed to conduct a childcare site feasibility study that would work to identify potential sites for a future childcare facility, and if a site was selected then work on plans to develop a "shovel ready" project would be considered.

The detailed project description written by First 5 was received the week before the grant application was due. When the Town reviewed the proposed scope, there were several concerns. One was that the proposal implied that a site had already been determined for a future childcare facility, although that site was not identified in the scope and the focus of the project description was on facility development plans. The Town was also confused as to why other childcare stakeholders in the community including IMACA and the Mono County Child Care Council (MCCCC) were not included in the development of the project scope or asked to provide information for the grant application. Additionally, given the Town's familiarity with capital projects, there were concerns that the proposed scope was not realistic or feasible within the proposed grant limit of up to \$250,000. The amount of staff time required to manage the proposed grant was also estimated to be beyond what the grant would fund.

Overall, there was not adequate time to develop the details needed to prepare a competitive grant application and for those reasons the decision was made not to submit the application. In the future, the Town and co-applicants will need to work together early in the process and allow adequate time before the submittal deadline to develop detailed project descriptions and deliverables to ensure a competitive application as well as the availability of resources to manage the grant.

Moving forward, the Town is working with MCCCC to have a broader childcare needs assessment conducted. We recognize there is a substantial need for childcare for infants, toddlers, preschool and even school aged children and are aware of previous studies completed by First 5 and other

agencies regarding childcare needs in Mammoth Lakes and Mono County. However, we feel that there is not enough current comprehensive or detailed data regarding the diversity of need by age, location, types of care desired, times/days needed, and existing barriers including but not limited to transportation and cost. Additional information on current childcare operators and options will also be beneficial, and we are aware that the Local Planning Council (LPC) Coordinator is already compiling some of this information. The data will help to inform decisions on facility and staffing needs and requirements and will support and strengthen any future grant applications, whether for CDBG or other funds.

The MCCCC, which includes stakeholders representing at least six local agencies and organizations, is preparing to complete its five-year needs assessment as mandated by the state. We are working with the MCCCC on this detailed assessment. This framework follows state guidelines, and the Town of Mammoth Lakes has had discussions with the LPC Coordinator to determine how best to partner to include additional information to inform future projects.

In addition to the needs assessment being undertaken by MCCCC, the Town is working with The Pacific Companies (Pacific) and IMACA to build a new childcare center as part of the first phase of The Parcel (the Town's affordable housing development) scheduled to be open summer/fall 2023. The Town and Pacific are working closely with IMACA to ensure that the shell of the building will be designed to meet the needs of IMACA's future facility as well as working to plan for the build-out of the interior of the building and to secure funding required for that work. The Town is working with Pacific and IMACA to partner on potential funding opportunities. This will increase the number of spaces for infant, toddler, and preschool children.

The Town has also been working with the Mono County Office of Education (MCOE) about possible grant opportunities to reinvigorate its former plans for a childcare center. So far none of the opportunities reviewed have been the right fit for the project. We will continue to be mindful of future opportunities working with MCOE and the MCCCC, as well as other possible projects with other stakeholders including First 5.

We look forward to continuing to work together with childcare community stakeholders to fully understand the scope of childcare needs in our community and partner to increase childcare availability within Mammoth Lakes and Mono County.
